Detecting Dangerous Demeanours

Dr Paul Ekman and his associates at the Ekman Group have spent the last 30 years researching emotions that immediately precede violent behaviour and developing the Dangerous Demeanour Detector (D3) for law enforcement and national security agencies in the United States.

Sparked initially by materials provided by the U.S. Secret Service and recently completed with support from the US Department of Defence D3 is the only training of its type in the world. New Intelligence is the Australasian partner of the Ekman group and now provides D3 training for the public and private sectors.

In just over 4 hours participants will recognise how to distinguish the micro-expressions of emotion that are most commonly associated with imminent violent behaviour. Most will improve their ability to detect and read these expressions by up to 80%.

Who should attend?

Anyone who is engaged in situations where there is the potential for violence and who wants to detect early warning signals of such violence.

During a routine cell inspection in an Australian State based prison one of two inspecting officers watched as the inmate started to walk towards the other officer. He reported sensing that there was imminent danger for his colleague and moved to restrain the prisoner who was later found to be in possession of home made knife with which he had intended to stab the officer in revenge for earlier reporting him for misconduct. When asked how he knew of the danger he stated,

“I am not sure but it was something in the set of his jaw and his eyes that said to me ‘Look out, this guy is going to do something’”. When later shown an expression of anger mixed with contempt the officer recognised

The Ekman Group's research has involved law enforcement officers in five very different countries around the world, all of whom have been attacked physically, remembered the face of the attacker, and identified the expression that occurred just moments before the

attack. Their data show a high degree of agreement across the cultures and officers on the face of imminent assault.

The purpose of the D3 training is to alert any potentially vulnerable person of the need to be more on guard, and perhaps take protective action. Often reading the face of the person before an assault happens will allow practitioners to take defensive or evasive action that will result in stopping an attack before it starts.
